in this case into the account of an adult
patient. In some rare cases there is no material evidence
admitting to it, yet also giving signs which cannot be explained.
In such cases, when one can not be sure what
peculiar condition exists, it is best to bring the
patient to the hospital. It is better to be safe than sorry.
If you do not transport him himself, it is well to make
arrangements before he comes. You may make your
wife, or child, or friend, if you like, responsible.
You may then inform Dr. [unclear] Dr. [unclear] Dr. [unclear]
your own doctor, government, proprietor, or manager,
etc. If the patient is to be sent to another city, you
can send a certificate with him to the physician at
the new place. This will remove suspicion, and avoid the
possibility of his being detained. Many cases have been
thus removed, recently. My advice, as I have done
many families both by myself and others
in this country, is to let him go. To do this
will be a service to your friend in giving him a chance
to recover his health, and to return to you.
